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OTHER EXHIBITOR PARKING

No parking at campers or around buildings; 1 pass per livestock exhibitor family for exhibitor parking lots between horse barns and infield; ALL deliveries to barns must be made before 10 a.m. **Unload vehicle and move it to parking area.**

LIVESTOCK EXHIBITOR PARKING

All Livestock Exhibitor Parking shall be in the designated in-field area. All vehicles entering the Livestock Gate shall display a Barn Pass. All occupants must have an Exhibitor Pass, Season Pass or Daily Admission. Livestock and horse trailers left for the week will park in designated area at north end of parking lot.

LIVESTOCK ARRIVAL TIMES: The State Vet will be on the fairground on Sunday, Noon to 4:00pm and Monday, 9:00am to 7:00pm ONLY. All livestock MUST ARRIVE on the fairgrounds during these hours. Animals arriving outside of these hours will be IMMEDIATELY SENT HOME. No animals are to be unloaded until checked by the State Vet. These requirements will be strictly enforced.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

(Rules subject to change without prior notice)

All rules and regulations published in this book are made a part of the conditions under which all entries are accepted, or exhibit space of concessions licenses are granted.

The Otsego County Fair Association, Inc. management reserves the final and absolute right to interpret these rules and regulations and arbitrarily settle and determine all matters, questions and differences in regard thereto, or otherwise arising out of, connection with, or incidental to the Fair.

The management reserves the right to amend or add to these rules and regulations as in its judgement may be deemed advisable.

Any person who violates any of the following general rules and regulations or any special rule or rules shall forfeit all privileges and premiums and be subject to such penalty as the management may order.

Rule 1. Time for Making Entries. Entries may be made by mail or personally at any time after this list is received. Exhibitors are required to make themselves acquainted with the premium book and regulations so as to make certain in which sections and departments their entries belong as well as period of exhibit. Exhibitors must use separate blanks for entries in each department. Additional blanks will be furnished upon application.

Rule 2. Place for Making Entries. Entries may be made by mail or in person at the Office of the Entry Clerk, Fairgrounds, Morris, NY. The tags for the various exhibits will be mailed, providing the correct amount of entry fee is enclosed. Checks should be made payable to the Otsego County Fair Association, Inc. If entries are received too late for tags to reach exhibitors in time for the Fair, tags will be held at the Secretary's Office on the grounds, where they may be called for. If you wish to have your tags mailed to you, time permitting, please enclose a self-addressed stamped envelope.

Rule 3. Closing of Entries. Entries cannot be made after the closing date specified in each department except in the case of an emergency, if otherwise specified, and only then on a certificate of the Superintendent of the Department, whose judgement shall be final.

Rule 4. All exhibits must be entered in the name of the bona fide owner, such ownership to have existed at least 30 days previous to the time of the showing, unless exhibited by the original producer or fabricator of the article exhibited and proof of ownership must be presented by the exhibitor on request of the Fair Association.

No judges shall be permitted to enter exhibits in competition for premiums in the Department with which they are connected.

Rule 5. Examination of Entry Cards. Exhibitors are requested to examine their entry cards at the time of making entries so that if any mistakes have been made, they can be corrected. No person can make any change or withdraw any article entered for competition or exhibition after having once entered it. THIS RULE WILL BE RIGIDLY ENFORCED IN ALL DEPARTMENTS. THERE WILL BE NO REFUND OF ENTRY FEES.

Rule 6. Display of Entry Tags and Ribbons. An entry tag must be attached to each exhibit. This tag will be furnished by the Fair Office when entries are made. All entry tags and ribbons must be displayed during the exhibition. No consideration will be given by judges to any article to which the entry tag is not attached. The judges will not award a premium to any animal or article which has not been properly entered.

Rule 7. Entries Limited to Capacity. All entries of livestock will be limited to the capacity of our present buildings, and will be recorded in the order received. The management reserves the right to reject all entries after the capacity has been reached. No animals or article will be entitled to a place on the grounds until a proper entry thereof shall have been made, except in case of an emergency and then only at the discretion of the Superintendent of the particular Department concerned.

Rule 8. Competition Defined. Competition is defined as a contest for supremacy between two or more products, or articles or animals owned by separate exhibitors. Exhibitors having no competition in a class or section will be awarded but one premium (the first or second premium, as judges think deserved) unless otherwise noted under Special Department Rules and all premiums shall be awarded subject to the action of the Board of Directors.

Rule 9. Computation of Ages of All Animals. The

ages of all animals must be given, and satisfactorily verified, if required. Ages of all animals shall be computed from January 1st, to determine in what classes the animals shall be entered. (Except as otherwise noted.)

Rule 10. Display of Exhibits and Animals. Exhibitors must show their exhibits whenever and in such a manner as required by the executive officers in charge of the department. All animals will be shown in the ring and exhibitors must be ready to bring them out when called, either for judgement or parade. Failure to do so entails forfeiture of all prizes.

Rule 11. Placing of Exhibits. All exhibits must be in place at the proper time, on the opening day of the Fair, except as otherwise noted.

Rule 12. Removal of Exhibits. No exhibit may be removed from the grounds until after 8:00 P.M. Sunday, except livestock: Animals sold at livestock auction can leave immediately after sale; cattle 6:30 pm; sheep & swine 7:30 pm; goats 8 pm; horses 8:30 pm. This rule will be rigidly enforced, and it is the purpose of the management to have all exhibits on the closing day equally attractive in every department as at any time during the week.

Rule 13. Exhibitors Responsible for Entries. The Fair Management will not be responsible for the omission of any article or animal not entered strictly in accordance with its rules.

Rule 14. Stalls and Forage for Animals. Stalls or pens for livestock will be ready for exhibition stock one day prior to show opening, until the close of the Fair. No feed or bedding of any description will be furnished to livestock or poultry during the exhibition. There will be a fee of \$2.00 per stall or \$3.00 per pen **where noted**.

Rule 15. Tickets. Admission to grounds by Ticket Only.

Rule 16. Entry Fees. All exhibitors will be charged an entry fee equal to ten percent of the first premium on each article competed for except in the 4-H and Educational Departments, unless otherwise specified in the Special Department rules.

Rule 17. Liability. Every possible protection and courtesy will be extended to exhibitors at the Otsego County Fair, but the Management shall not be responsible for any lost exhibits, animals or equipment in case of fire, cyclone, theft or loss from other causes; and the Association will not assume any liability for personal injury sustained by exhibitors, helpers, visitors or guests. The Management will use diligence to ensure the safety of articles entered

for exhibition after their arrival and placement but under no circumstances will it be responsible for any loss, injury or damage done to, or occasioned by, or arising from, any article on exhibition, and the exhibitor shall indemnify the Fair Management thereof, against all legal or other proceedings in regard thereto.

Rule 18. Payment of Premiums. Premium checks will be paid to the winners of the various awards as shown on the Judge's records. Exhibitors desiring their premium money paid to agent or employees must furnish same with written order of power of attorney to this effect. All premiums advertised and awarded will be paid in full without deduction in the guise of donations or otherwise. Exhibits taken from fair prior to published release time will forfeit premiums.

In paying premiums, no evidence of award shall be recognized except the Judges' book properly signed by the Judges and not from ribbons that may be attached to exhibits.

Should stormy weather or unavoidable occurrence interpose at any Fair to reduce the net receipts below the required premiums, the Management reserves the right to pay premiums on a pro rata basis after all expense is paid.

As the Management is required by law to make sure an early detailed report to the State Agriculture Department, all checks issued for premiums must be presented for payment within 60 days from date of issuance.

Rule 19. Protests. All protests must be in writing, must state plainly the complaint and must be delivered to the Secretary within six hours after the cause of protest, with a deposit of \$5.00.

Rule 20. Judges. As far as possible the single judge system will rule and great care will be taken to select those who are qualified.

Judges will receive their books from the Secretary and when the award is completed, the books properly signed by the Judges in every case, must be returned to him at once.

No person or persons will be allowed to interfere with the judges in the discharge of their duties. Persons wishing to explain in regard to their exhibits can do so through the Superintendent of the Department.

In case an animal or article has not been entered, the judge must not award a premium or have it entered after entries close. No consideration should be given by the judge to any article to which the entry tag is not attached. When judges have reason to doubt the pedigree of any animal

or bird, or the presentation made on any article, they must report at once to the Superintendent of that Department, who will gather such evidence as he can at the Secretary's office or by other methods.

Where exhibits have been erroneously entered, the judges may have the same corrected by an Entry Clerk, in the Secretary's Office before they judge the class, but not after. **No additions to or changes in the Judge's Record shall be made by any person except an Entry Clerk in the Secretary's Office.**

The decision of the judges shall be final in all classes, except where mistakes, frauds or misrepresentations are shown. In all such cases the directors, or such referee as the directors may select, shall decide.

Rule 21. Permits and Privileges. The Management reserves the right of cancellation at any time for reason satisfactory to it, of all contracts made with concessionaires.

Each concessionaire must confine himself to the space assigned to him. Failure to do so will subject them to forfeiture of their privilege, without recourse.

Concessionaires must abide by the laws of State, County and Town. Anyone found violating these laws will be closed, forfeiting their concession money and ordered from the grounds. All drinking and eating concessions must furnish themselves with proper and sanitary equipment that will comply with rules and regulations of the Health Department. This rule will be strictly enforced.

All concessions shall keep posted in plain view, at the front entrance to, a sign showing the price to be charged for meals, lunches or other articles of food offered for sale or services performed.

Concessionaires and commercial exhibitors shall be issued tickets on individual bases.

The Management authorizes the letting of only privileges or concessions as are required to supply the necessary want of the people or that may add to their comfort, convenience or pleasure, but under no circumstances will a privilege of a questionable nature or of a demoralizing tendency be let in any manner tolerated upon the grounds, or in buildings, nor will any privilege be permitted where the business is conducted on other than legitimate and trade-like manner.

The Fair Management will use every precaution to guard against extortion in any form practiced upon patrons of the Fair. A violation of this rule by the concessionaire will cause forfeiture of contract, money paid, or expulsion from the grounds as the Management may direct.

Rule 22., Advertising Restrictions. Under no circumstances will any person or firm be allowed to place any advertising matter upon buildings, trees, or other place on the grounds, nor will they be permitted to distribute advertising matter outside the place assigned to them

Rule 23. Sale of Goods by Exhibitors. Exhibitors will not be allowed to sell goods without permission (though they may receive book orders) nor will they be allowed to call attention to their wares in a noisy or disorderly manner.

Rule 24. Soliciting Prohibited. The circulation of subscriptions lists or soliciting in any manner, for whatsoever purpose, will not be permitted in any building, or on the Fairgrounds other than in regularly authorized concessions, and in these excepted instances only upon the written authorization of the officer in charge.

Rule 25. Radios, etc. All sound-producing must be of such nature as to not cause annoyance or inconvenience to visitors or other exhibitors. Permission for use of same must be first obtained from the Secretary.

Rule 26. Exhibitors Erecting Separate Buildings. Exhibitors wishing to erect separate buildings or additional work buildings should make their requests to the Secretary. In all cases the exhibitors must bear the expense. Any structure erected and not removed within ten (10) days after the close of the Fair, shall become the property of the Otsego County Fair Association.

Rule 27. Electric Lights and Power. Charges for electricity and wiring shall be made to exhibitors and concessionaires in keeping with schedule on file in the office of the Secretary of the Fair which will be furnished upon request. Only electric and gas stoves will be allowed in buildings.

Rule 28. Delivery trucks. No supply truck or wagon will be admitted to the grounds any day of the Fair after 10:00 A.M. except in the case of serious emergency.

The Fair Management reserves the right to exclude any and all delivery vehicles, if in their judgement their methods are detrimental to the best interest of the Fair.

Rule 29. Parking. Automobiles and all other vehicles must be parked in spaces designated by the Management and not elsewhere. The Management shall not be liable under any circumstances whether of negligence of itself, its agents, or otherwise for any injury to his or her person for any loss or injury to his or her property.

Rule 30. Undesirables. Beggars, touts or any person found practicing objectionable professions will be

immediately escorted from the Fairgrounds.

Rule 31. Invitation of Officers of Other Agricultural Societies. Officers of other Agricultural Societies are invited to attend the Otsego County Fair and are respectfully requested to present themselves at the Secretary's Office.

Rule 32. The Otsego County Fair will be held at Morris, New York as stated on front cover, both dates inclusive unless postponed or cancelled as a result of War, Acts of God, Government regulations or any other reason.

Rule 33. Eastern Daylight Savings Time will be observed.

Rule 34. Failure to abide by any Fair Rules or failure

to cooperate with any superintendent or official, will result in forfeiture of premiums and exclusion from next year's show.

Rule 35. To ensure the safety of our exhibitors we are asking that traffic through the exhibitor's gate and around the barns and show ring be limited. We are asking that participants limit their vehicular use for delivering feed, etc. to early morning before show times. The exhibitor gate will be closed at 10 pm.

Rules and Regulations of the Department of Agriculture and Markets

Part 350—STANDARD CONDUCT OF FAIRS

(Statutory authority: Agriculture and Markets Law Section 287)

Sections

- 350.2 No fee for 4-H, FFA, Junior Fair or School Department Exhibits
- 350.3 Prompt, full payment of premiums
- 350.4 No premium for unworthy exhibit
- 350.5 Premium amount to attract well-balanced exhibits
- 350.6 No exhibits by judges in departments they oversee
- 350.7 Exhibits to be plainly labeled
- 350.8 Re-exhibition in domestic department
- 350.9 Ownership of exhibits entered in fairs and shows
- 350.10 Rejection or refusal of exhibits entered in fairs and shows
- 350.11 Compliance with and enforcement of livestock health requirements

Sec. 350.2 No Fee for 4-H, FFA, Junior Fair or School Department Exhibits. No entry fee shall be charged for 4-H Club, FFA, Junior Fair exhibits wanted for competition in their own classes, or for entries in the School Department.

Sec. 350.3 Prompt, Full Payment of Premiums. All premiums advertised and awarded must be paid promptly and in full, without deduction in the guise of donations or otherwise, notwithstanding any statement to the contrary or in modification thereof announced or stated in the premium book.

Sec. 350.4 No premium for unworthy exhibit. No premium should be awarded by any judge or paid by any society for

an unworthy exhibit.

Sec. 350.5 Premium amount to attract well-balanced exhibits. The amount of premium offered in the various departments should be such as to secure well-balanced exhibits, in the light of the types of agriculture carried on the territory served by the fair.

Sec. 350.6 No exhibits by judges in departments they oversee. No judges shall be permitted to enter exhibits in competition for premiums in the department with which they are connected.

350.7 Exhibits plainly labeled. All exhibits must be plainly labeled so that the full significance of the exhibits will be made clear.

Sec. 350.8 Re-exhibition in domestic department. No article shall be permitted to be exhibited in the domestic department if it has been previously exhibited therein, unless by official action of the board of directors of any fair society, and exception is made to this requirement.

Sec. 350.9 Exhibits in the name of the bona fide owners; ownership of horses entered in 4-H horse shows or exhibitions; poultry, sheep, swine.

(a) All exhibits must be entered in the name of the bona fide owner.

(b) Ownership of all exhibits must have existed for at least thirty (30) days previous to the time of showing, unless exhibited by the original producer or fabricator of the article exhibited.

(c) Proof of ownership of all exhibits must be presented by the exhibitor on request of the fair society.

(d) In the case of horses entered in 4-H horse shows or

exhibitions the animal may be owned by the exhibitor or his immediate family.

(e) In such departments as poultry, sheep or swine, the number of breeds that an exhibitor or family shows may be limited to the number of breeds to be determined by official action at a meeting of the board of directors of any fair society.

Sec. 350.10 Rejection or refusal of any exhibit. Any fair society shall reserve the right to reject or refuse and to order the removal of any exhibit which, in the opinion of its board of directors, is not eligible or worthy of showing or has not

met the livestock health requirements.

Sec. 350.11 Each fair or exposition which receives money from the State pursuant to article 24 of the Agriculture and Markets Law shall comply with and enforce the livestock requirements set forth in Part of 351 of this chapter.

ANIMAL HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR ADMISSION TO NEW YORK STATE AND COUNTY FAIRS

Part 351 of NYS Agriculture and markets Regulations

General Prohibitions and Requirements

- No person shall bring or have present an animal on the fairgrounds during a fair which is not qualified under NYS regulations.
- No person shall present an interstate or intrastate certificate of veterinary inspection that has been altered by anyone other than the issuing veterinarian or an authorized agent.
- Animals demonstrating clinical signs or other evidence of infectious, contagious or communicable diseases shall not be allowed on the fairgrounds during a fair.
- Representatives of the Commissioner may deny admission to or require removal from the fair premises, or require the segregation of any animal showing signs of or exposed to any infectious, contagious or communicable disease.

Note: The fair board of directors has the authority to reject unworthy or unsightly exhibits for reasons other than infectious, contagious or communicable disease (Part 350.10). The state veterinarian or animal health inspector will bring questionable exhibits to the attention of the fair board.

- All animals presented that originate from a location other than New York shall meet all New York State importation regulations appropriate to the species in addition to the fair animal health requirements.

Certificate of Veterinary inspection (CVI)

- Cattle, sheep, goats, swine, llamas, deer, monkeys, misc. ruminants, camels and elephants require a valid CVI to enter the fairgrounds.
- The CVI must be issued by an accredited veterinarian.
- All animals must be uniquely identified. All man made ID must be recorded. Refer to Animal Identification section below for more information.
- The type and duration of certificate required depends on the origin of the livestock.
- Only one species is allowed per certificate.

New York Origin Livestock:

- A valid intrastate CVI (AI 61) is required.
- Each animal must be individually identified on the CVI.
- The CVI must be issued on or after May 1 of the current year.

Out of State Origin Livestock

- All animals entering New York State must satisfy import health and test requirements for that species and be accompanied by a valid interstate CVI.
- The interstate CVI is valid for 30 days from the date of issuance. During the fair season (July 1 through Labor Day) valid CVI's can be used multiple times for entrance into fairs. The initial entrance into a fair must be within 30 days of issuance. In order for the CVI to be used for a later fair, it must be dated and initialed by a state official noting the location of the initial fair. A change in health status or eligibility of an animal necessitates the generation of a new CVI.

Animal Identification

- Animals requiring a CVI must be uniquely identified. Acceptable forms of unique identification include official eartag, legible registration tattoo, or electronic identification (microchip). A sketch or photograph signed and dated by an accredited veterinarian is acceptable identification for llamas and alpacas.
NOTE: A complete written description is sufficient identification for horses entering New York accompanied by a CVI. The description must match the EIA test record. Horse sketches and descriptions should reference color pattern, hair whorls, chestnuts, scars and other markings as necessary to uniquely identify the horse. "Bay, no marking" is not an acceptable description for a CVI or EIA test record.
- It is acceptable for a fair or organization (4-H for example) to utilize a unique tag for identification of market class cattle and swine. This tag must include an individual number for each animal and must be approved prior to the fair.
- If electronic ID is utilized as the sole form of identification, the exhibitor is responsible for supplying a working electronic reader. If electronic ID cannot be read entry will be denied.
- Acceptable identification allows positive matching of the animal to all accompanying documents including papers with laboratory test results and vaccination statements.
- Horse sketches and descriptions should reference color pattern, hair whorls, chestnuts, scars and other markings.
- Llama and alpaca drawings must positively identify the individual animal.
- A name or a statement of color without additional distinguishing features or man made identification is not acceptable identification.
- USDA approved scrapie identification is required for all sheep and goats.

Rabies Vaccination

- Current rabies vaccination is required for all species for which there is a USDA licensed vaccine available (cattle, horses, sheep, dog, cat, ferret) and that are 105 days or older on the date of admission to the fair.
- An animal is currently vaccinated beginning 14 days following primary (initial) vaccination continuing for the period stated in the manufacturer's instructions.
- Rabies vaccine label instructions allow vaccination as early as 84 days of age. This allows a one week window between 84 and 91 days of age (105 minus 14 days) where vaccine can be administered to meet the 105 day requirement.
- Animals previously vaccinated for rabies but whose vaccination status has expired, are eligible for exhibition immediately upon receiving a booster vaccination. Proof of previous vaccination is required.
- If an animal reaches the minimum age for rabies vaccination during the fair season, the vaccination requirement must be met even if the animal was previously admitted to a fair when too young to vaccinate.

- **Note:** Individual fairs can require animals for which there is no approved rabies vaccine to be currently vaccinated for rabies. The requirements outlined above would apply. The fair is responsible for notifying exhibitors.

Acceptable Proof of Rabies Vaccination

- Acceptable proof of rabies vaccination must include a signed written statement from the attending veterinarian or a valid certificate of veterinary inspection that has the vaccination listed and is signed by the attending veterinarian.
- Acceptable proof of vaccination must include the name of the product used, the date of administration and the duration of immunity if longer than one year.
- If the statement of rabies vaccination is included on an EIA test record, it must be signed separately in addition to the required EIA test record signature.
- NOTE: Rabies titers are not acceptable proof of rabies protection and cannot be used to meet entry requirements.
- Acceptable proof of vaccination for dogs is a valid vaccination certificate or a copy of the dog license that contains the rabies vaccination information.

BVD-PI Testing

- All cattle and new world camelids (llamas, alpacas, guanacos and vicunas) exhibited at NY county fairs or the State Fair must be negative to an approved test appropriate to detect Bovine Viral Diarrhea persistent infection (BVD-PI). This is a once in a lifetime test that must be reported on the required certificate of veterinary inspection. The issuing veterinarian is responsible for verifying the validity of the test, the identification of the animal and recording the test date on the CVI. If a previous test is not verifiable the test must be repeated.

Cattle Testing:

- Currently acceptable tests for cattle less than 61 days old:
 - skin notch Antigen Capture ELISA (ACE) or Immunohistochemistry (IHC)
 - whole blood virus isolation
 - whole blood PCR
- Currently acceptable test for cattle 61 days of age and older:
 - Skin notch Antigen Capture ELISA (ACE) or Immunohistochemistry (IHC)
 - Serum or milk Antigen Capture ELISA (ACE)
 - Whole blood virus isolation
 - Whole blood, serum or plasma PCR

NOTE: The NYS Veterinary Diagnostic Laboratory at Cornell University can conduct PCR testing on pools of up to 10 cattle.

Llama, Alpaca, Guanaco, Vicuna Testing:

- Currently acceptable BVD tests:
 - PCR
 - Whole blood virus isolation

NOTE: The NYS Veterinary Diagnostic Laboratory at Cornell University can pool llama, etc. samples for PCR testing as follows: Animals less than 61 days of age can be tested in pools of 2 animals, whole blood only.

Animals 61 days of age and older can be tested in pools of 5 animals using whole blood, serum or plasma.

Cleaning and Disinfection

- All buildings on the fairgrounds housing animals must be cleaned and disinfected prior to the opening of the fair and between groups of animals when housing is rotated (Section 50.2 of Agriculture and Market regulations).

Kidding and Lambing

- Due to the concern about the spread of scrapie, any sheep or goats that are exhibited at a county fair that have recently given birth or have a vaginal discharge, will be ordered removed along with their offspring.

- The causative agent for scrapie may be present in high concentration in fluids associated with birth and the risk of transmission is considered highest at that time.

Commingling of Sheep/Goats and Cattle

- Due to the potential spread of malignant catarrhal fever from sheep and goats to cattle, it is recommended that cattle be kept separate from sheep and goats.

Commingling of Swine and Poultry

- Due to the potential spread of influenza viruses it is recommended that swine and poultry be housed in separate locations..

Isolation on Returning Home

- The owner or custodian shall keep show animals biologically separate from the herd or flock for a period of at least two weeks after returning to the premises of origin.

Individual Species Requirements

Horses

- Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) is not required for New York origin horses. CVI is required for imported horses.
- Negative Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) test is required for all horses 6 months of age or older. The horse must be accompanied by a valid negative EIA test record. Horses less than 6 months of age accompanied by a test negative dam do not have to be tested. Horses less than 6 months of age not accompanied by the dam must be test negative. The test must have been conducted during the current or previous calendar years for New York origin horses. For imported horses, the test must be conducted within 12 months of entry.
- The EIA test certificate must include a complete description of the horse.
- Current rabies vaccination is required for all horses 105 days of age or older (see above).

Cattle

- Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with animals individually identified.
- Current rabies vaccination is required for all cattle 105 days of age or older (see above).
- All cattle must be negative to an approved test appropriate to detect Bovine Viral Diarrhea persistent infection (BVD-PI). (See current acceptable tests above). The date and results of the testing must be noted on the certificate of veterinary inspection.
- All cattle must be currently vaccinated against bovine respiratory disease complex including bovine respiratory syncytial virus, bovine virus diarrhea, infectious bovine rhinotracheitis and parainfluenza with a product administered in a manner and time frame adequate to confer protective immunity for these diseases for the duration of the fair.

Sheep

- Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with animals individually identified with USDA approved individual scrapie program identification. Identification must be one of the following: 1) USDA approved tags or 2) a USDA approved flock tattoo or 3) electronic ID if the sheep is enrolled in the Scrapie Flock Certification Program (owner must supply a working electronic reader).
For more information on scrapie ID, contact USDA at 518218-7540.
- Current rabies vaccination is required for all sheep 105 days of age or older (see above).
- The CVI must contain a written statement from the issuing accredited veterinarian that the flock of origin was inspected after May 1 of the current year and no evidence of contagious, infectious or communicable diseases was found.
- If evidence of soremouth (contagious ecthyma) is found on any sheep, the entire exhibit including the affected animals shall immediately be removed from the fair premises with the holding pens cleaned and disinfected immediately after removal.

Goat

- Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with animals individually identified with USDA approved individual scrapie program identification. Identification must be one of the following: 1) USDA approved tags or 2) a legible registration tattoo with official registration paper accompanying the animal or 3) a USDA approved herd tattoo and individual ID number 4) electronic ID if the goat is enrolled in the Scrapie Flock Certification Program and/or the electronic ID is recorded on the goats registration paper (owner must supply a working electronic reader).
For information on scrapie ID, contact USDA at 518-218-7540.
- The CVI must contain a written statement from the issuing accredited veterinarian that the herd of origin was inspected after May 1 of the current year and no evidence of contagious, infectious or communicable diseases was found.
- If evidence of soremouth (contagious ecthyma) is found on any goat, the entire exhibit including the affected animals shall immediately be removed from the fair premises with the holding pens cleaned and disinfected immediately after removal.

Swine

- Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with animals individually identified.

Llamas and Alpacas

- Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with animals individually identified.
- All llamas, etc. must be negative to an approved test appropriate to detect Bovine Viral Diarrhea persistent infection (BVD-PI). (See current accepted tests above. The date and results of the testing must be noted on the certificate of veterinary inspection.

Poultry

- Poultry (with the exception of doves, pigeons and waterfowl) must be accompanied by 1) results of a negative pullorum typhoid test conducted within 90 days prior to exhibition OR 2) proof that the birds originated directly from a US pullorum-typhoid clean flock or equivalent flock.

Deer (Cervidae)

- Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with animals individually identified.
- Originate from a herd classified as accredited or qualified under USDA tuberculosis regulations.
- A movement permit obtained from the Division of Animal Industry is required for all deer movements. All CWD requirements must be met before a permit will be issued. Questions regarding movement permits should be directed to the Division of Animal industry at 518-457-3971.

Miscellaneous Ruminants / Camels

- Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with animals individually identified.

Elephants

- Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with animals individually identified.
- All elephants presented for admission to a fair must be exhibited pursuant to a current USDA license.

Non-human Primates

- Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with animals individually identified.
- Proof of a negative intradermal tuberculosis test performed within 12 months of admission.

**NYS DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE AND MARKETS
FAIR REQUIREMENTS FOR ANIMALS ORIGINATING FROM NEW YORK**

ANIMALS NEEDING CERTIFICATES OF VETERINARY INSPECTION (CVI):

Certificates:

1. Contains positive identification on all animals to be exhibited.
2. Certify individual inspections on each animal.
3. Was issued by an accredited veterinarian on or after May 1 of the current year.
4. Lists dates for required vaccines including last booster dose.

First dose of rabies vaccine must be administered at least 14 days prior to your arrival on the fairgrounds.

Booster doses can be given at any time.

Rabies vaccine for horses and cattle are only good for 12 months.

Sheep can be vaccinated every three years after the first and booster doses.

All cattle, sheep and horses over 105 days old must be vaccinated for rabies.

SPECIES	ADDITIONAL REQUIREMENTS
Cattle	Vaccinated for IBR, BVD, P13 and BRSV - Vaccinated for rabies.
Sheep/Goats	Flock inspection on or after May 1. Sheep vaccinated for rabies/goats if required by fair. Identified by registration tattoo or USDA approved official tattoo or tag.
Llamas	Identification can be photograph initialed by veterinarian. Negative TB test for llamas 12 months of age or older <u>or</u> from a herd tested negative for tuberculosis within past 5 years.
Deer	From tuberculosis accredited free herd or qualified herd.
All other ruminants, camels, swine	CVI required but no specific test or vaccines required.
Elephants	CVI plus evidence that exhibitor has USDA license

ANIMALS WHICH DO NOT NEED CERTIFICATES OF VETERINARY INSPECTION

SPECIES	REQUIREMENTS
Horses	Negative EIA test done during current year or previous calendar year. Rabies vaccination within past 12 months.
Poultry	Proof that flock of origin is pullorum clean or individual test within 90 days for all poultry except waterfowl, doves & pigeons.

IN ADDITION, ALL ANIMALS FROM OUTSIDE NEW YORK MUST HAVE AN INTERSTATE CERTIFICATE OF VETERINARY INSPECTION (CVI) AND MUST MEET ALL NEW YORK IMPORT REQUIREMENTS.

INTERSTATE HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR FAIR ANIMALS

This document is a supplement to the Animal Health Requirements published for animals exhibited at New York State county fairs and the State Fair. Its purpose is to summarize the import requirements that must be met for livestock entering New York destined for fairs. Note that individual county fairs may require rabies vaccination in species not required by the state. Contact the specific fair for their requirements. Further assistance can be obtained by contacting the Division of Animal Industry (DAI) at 518-457-3502 or your State Veterinarian's office.

CERTIFICATE OF VETERINARY INSPECTION (CVI)

A CVI is required for all animals moving interstate. Note that interstate CVI's must be issued by an accredited veterinarian and countersigned by the State Veterinarian in the state of origin. The interstate CVI is valid for 30 days from the date of issuance. During the fair season, from July 1 through Labor Day, Interstate CVI's can be used multiple times as long as the initial entrance to a fair in NY is within 30 days of issuance and the CVI is initialed by a state official. All documentation must accompany the animals. Animals not meeting the interstate and/or fair requirements will not be allowed on the grounds. Individual ID is required on all animals. Animals with incomplete or illegible ID will be rejected. Where rabies vaccination is required, the information can be included on the health certificate.

HORSES

Horses 6 months of age or older must test negative for equine infectious anemia. The test must be conducted within 12 months of the day of entry. The horse must be clearly and completely identified. Rabies vaccination is required for all horses over 105 days of age. Horses less than 6 months of age must be accompanied by the dam or EIA test negative.

CATTLE

Cattle from the neighboring states of New England, New Jersey, Ohio and Pennsylvania can enter with CVI only. No tests are required. For information on other state, please contact DAI at 518-457-3971. Vaccination for rabies and the bovine respiratory disease complex is required. Cattle from all states must be test negative for BVD-PI with results noted in the CVI.

SHEEP

Sheep from the neighboring states of New England, New Jersey, Pennsylvania and Ohio can enter with CVI only. No tests are required. All sheep must be identified by a USDA approved tag, a USDA approved premises tattoo, or electronic ID if the sheep is enrolled in the Scrapie Flock Certification Program. The veterinary statement concerning the flock inspection is required. Rabies vaccination is required for all sheep over 105 days of age. Negative bluetongue testing is required from some states. For information in other states, please contact DAI at 518-457-3971.

GOATS

Imported goats six months of age and older must be test negative for brucellosis. Goats twelve months of age and older must be tested negative for tuberculosis. The veterinary statement concerning the herd inspection is required. All goats must be identified by a USDA approved tag, legible registration tattoo (with registration papers), a USDA approved premises tattoo, or electronic ID if enrolled in the Scrapie Flock Certification Program.

SWINE

Swine from the neighboring states of New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Ohio and six New England states can enter with CVI only. No tests are required. For more information on other states, please contact DAI at 518-457-3971.

LLAMAS

Llamas from the neighboring states of New England, New Jersey, Pennsylvania and Ohio must test negative for brucellosis and tuberculosis. Brucellosis testing is required for llamas 6 months of age and older and must be conducted within 30 days of entry. Tuberculosis testing is required for llamas 1 year of age and older and must be conducted within 60 days of entry. TB test must be done using the axillary method. For information on other states, please contact DAI at 518-457-3971.

DEER - (CERVIDAE)

Deer must meet the Federal interstate requirements for tuberculosis testing (be from an accredited or qualified herd). Brucellosis testing is required for deer greater than six months of age. A written permit issued by the Division of Animal Industry is required in advance. For complete information, please contact the Division of Animal Industry at 518-457-3971

BIRDS

Out of state poultry must be accompanied by the NPIP flock certificate if the flock is NPIP certified. Otherwise a CVI is required. Poultry, with the exception of doves, pigeons and waterfowl, must test negative for pullorum within 30 days if importation of not from an NPIP Pullorum-Typhoid Clean Flock. Other birds must be accompanied by a CVI. For more information, contact DAI at 518-457-3971.

MONKEYS

CVI plus negative TB test within 12 months of exhibition is required.

ELEPHANTS

CVI plus evidence of current USDA Exhibitor's License.

MISC. RUMINANTS AND CAMELS

CVI

IAFE (INTERNATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF FAIRS AND EXPOSITIONS) NATIONAL CODE OF SHOW RING ETHICS

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. In addition to the "IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics," fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations which they impose on the local, county, state, provincial and national levels.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

1. All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
2. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.
3. Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs or livestock shows.
4. Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of drugs. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in an event which culminates with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state, provincial statutes, regulations and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event.

If the laboratory report on the chemical analysis of saliva, urine, blood or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested by the approved laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise at any hearing in regard to the matter conducted by the fair or livestock show.

At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.

5. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, confirmation or appearance, except external application of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.

6. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.

7. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.

8. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.

9. The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.

10. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer or absolutely responsible person to have any disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show against such individuals published in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including Fairs and Expositions and any special notices to members.

11. The act of entering of an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.

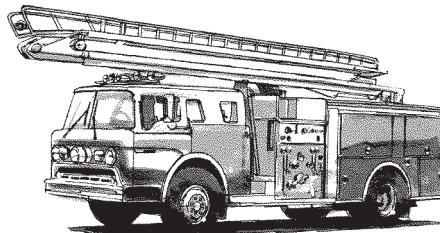

SEC. 351.7 of NEW YORK STATE AG AND MARKETS REGULATIONS REQUIRES THAT ALL HORSES AND PONIES PRESENT ON THE FAIRGROUNDS, WHETHER ENTERED IN EVENTS OR NOT, BE NEGATIVE TO AN IMMUNODIFFUSION TEST FOR EQUINE INFECTIOUS ANEMIA (SWAMP FEVER).

• **NON-NYS Animals:** All animals entering NYS must satisfy import health and test requirements for that species. **The interstate CVI is valid for 30 days from the date of issuance with regard to entrance into New York State.**

During the fair season (July 1 through Labor Day) valid interstate CVI's can be used multiple times for entrance into fairs. The initial entrance into a fair must be within 30 days of issuance. In order for this certificate to be used at a later fair, it must be initialed and dated by a Fair Official. If it was issued greater than 30 days prior to movement and is not initialed, the animal will be denied admission. In addition to state entrance requirements, animal(s) must satisfy individual fair admission requirements. After entry into New York State, an interstate health chart can serve as a fair health certificate if fair requirements (in addition to interstate requirements) have been fulfilled.

Note: All vaccine requirements must be met during the duration of the fair. CVI's with vaccinations out of date at the time of the fair are invalid and the animals will be rejected.

1. **The Judge's decision will be final in all classes.**
2. The Show Committee reserves the right to combine or split classes if entries warrant and to change the order or ring in which classes will be run.
3. **The Show Committee reserves the right to remove any animal from the ring or the grounds whose behavior is believed to be a danger to others.**
4. Neither the Otsego County Fair nor the Horse Show Committee can accept any responsibility for any injuries or damages occurring to any horse or rider while on the Fairgrounds.

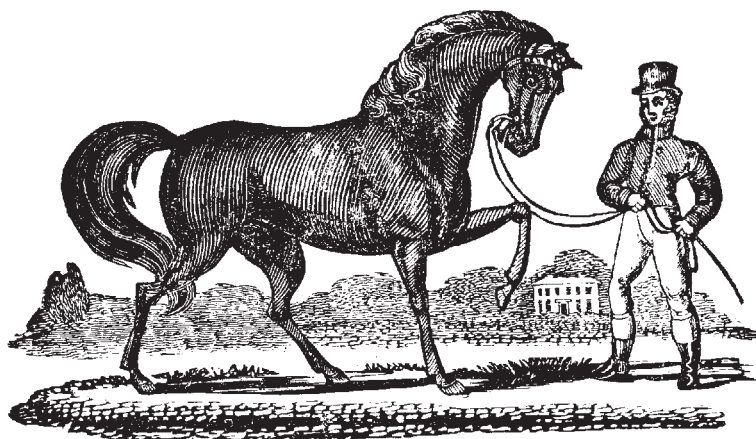

4. The Association reserves the right to accept or reject any entry, and to return any entry fee before the opening or judging of the show without being liable for compensation.

5. All animals exhibited in Department B (with the excep-

tion of section 4) must be registered in their respective herd books. Registration name and number must be given at time entry is made. All registration certificates must be available for examination by the Superintendent of the Cattle Department at any time.

6. All Beef/Oxen Exhibits will be housed in the beef barn and the building will be in readiness for the reception of entries on Sunday and all entries must be in place by 7:00 p.m. Monday. Exhibitors must report their arrival to the Director in Charge, who will allot stalls.

7. Exhibitors must provide their own haw and straw.

8. No animal or exhibit may be removed from the grounds before Sunday at 6:30 pm.

9. An exhibitor may show as many animals as he has entered in single classes, but may receive only two premiums per class. All animals shown in group classes must have been shown in individual classes.

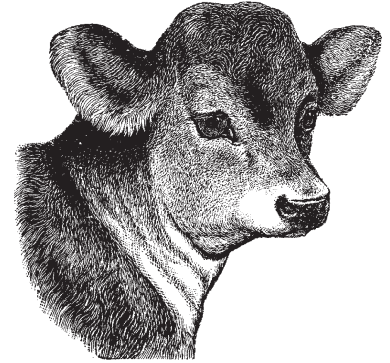

All Dairy Exhibitors:

Due to the severe penalties imposed by the State of New York Agricultural Department for the contamination of milk by antibiotics, we are forced to enact the following rules and regulations:

1. If antibiotics are detected in the milk, all users of the parlor will have to supply a milk sample for each milking animal.
2. Individuals or parties found having antibiotics in milk, which was processed through the parlor, will be liable for all financial loss created by contamination. We regret having to take such severe measures, but find it necessary to protect all those individuals using the milking facilities. These rules apply to all dairy cattle exhibitors - Read Carefully!

1. Entries in this department close July 19. There will be absolutely no entries after that date.

2. Competition open to exhibitors in Otsego County and any other county open to Otsego County Cattle Exhibitors.

3. The Otsego County Fair Association, Inc. assumes no responsibility in case of injury, loss, theft or damage to stock or other exhibits, from any cause, and upon this condition only are entries received; and the Association will not be responsible for or assume any liability for personal injuries sustained by exhibitors, helpers, visitors or guests.

4. The Association reserves the right to accept or reject any entry, and to return any entry fee before the opening or judging of the show without being liable for compensation.

5. All animals exhibited in Department BB must be registered in their respective herd books. For animals 4 months and over registration name and number, and proof of eligibility must be given at time entry is made. All registration certificates must be available for examination by the Superintendent of the Cattle Department.

6. The buildings and milking facilities will be in readiness for all pre-entered cattle on Sunday after 12:00 pm and until the morning following the closing of the Fair. Animals

must be in place by 7:00 pm Monday and remain until 6:30 pm the last day of the Fair. (All effort will be made to have premium checks at this time.) Refer to Rule 10.

7. EXHIBITORS MUST REPORT THEIR ARRIVAL TO THE Cattle SUPERINTENDENT WHO WILL HAVE STALLS ALLOTTED.

8. ALL ANIMALS MUST BE CHECKED BY STATE VET.

9. Exhibitors are to provide their own hay and straw.

10. No animal will be released until **6:30 pm Sunday**.

11. An exhibitor may show as many animals as he has entered in a single class, but may receive only two premiums per class. An exhibitor may show only one entry in any group class.

12. All animals shown in group classes must have been shown in individual classes.

13. Members of an immediate family, such as father and sons, brother and sister, father and daughters, mother and sons, may put their animals together for a group entry but registration papers must check with the entry, as one farm's address.

14. All animals will be shown in the ring, and exhibitors must be ready to bring them out when called for judging and upon request of the Superintendent, exhibitors must provide animals to be used in a 4-H or FFA Judging Contest.

15. Entries in this Department may be made by 4-H and FFA members by paying regular entry fee seven days prior to the opening date of the Fair, and by complying with all rules and regulations governing this department.

16. The Cattle Superintendent is authorized and empowered to cause the removal from the buildings and grounds of any and all animals failing to meet the health conditions herein specified. Eligibility of animals must comply with State Regulations effective the opening day of the Fair. This pertains to both dairy and beef cattle.

17. Exhibitors, upon release from the Fair, are advised to follow animal health precautions.

18. All exhibits must be ready for exhibits at 9:00 am.

19. All exhibitors in cattle buildings must maintain a clean, attractive exhibit and must clean out stalls and get a release slip before leaving the grounds. Failure to do so will revoke premiums.

20. Eligibility of animals for championships will at the discretion of the Judge.

21. Dairy Cattle Director will assign spaces for the animals.

22. All exhibitors must wear exhibitor number when in ring.

23. Any exhibitor removing animal from the ring before the animal has been dismissed by the Judge will forfeit the premium for that class.

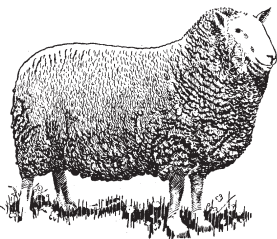

1. Entries must be made by July 19. **There will be absolutely no entries after that date.** Competition open to exhibitors of Otsego County and any county that recognizes Otsego County and its sheep exhibitors. Entry Fee is \$1.50 for each entry to be paid at the time entry is made. All sheep will be examined by State Veterinarian as to health charts, ear tags and registration papers. All exhibitors shall be present at this time. All animals must be in place by 7:00 p.m. Monday and must remain in place until 7:30 p.m. Sunday.
2. All sheep must have been owned by the exhibitor 30 days prior to the opening of the fair.
3. Market lambs for competition shall have been shorn within 7 days of exhibition.
4. All entries must have identification tag or tattoo by owner of their breed plus USDA approved scrapies tag in their ear, and registration numbers and certificates or tattoo will be required on all entries at time of judging.

5. An exhibitor is a person who pays the entry fee, buys an exhibitors ticket and can show proof of ownership for an animal. An exhibitor can show only (5) five breeds of sheep.
6. All entries must be brought out of pens to show. Failure to do so will cause forfeiture of prizes. **This will be enforced.**
7. Each exhibitor will be charged \$3.00 per pen.
8. Each exhibitor shall present a health certificate signed by an accredited veterinarian indicating that his flock is free of all contagious and infectious diseases, and is not under quarantine. Any sheep exhibiting evidence of contagious disease, internal or external parasites or in a generally unthrifty condition will be sent home immediately.
9. Definition: **Flock** shall consist of: One ram (Lamb or Yearling) and 3 ewes of at least 2 different ages.
10. An exhibitor may show as many animals as he has entered in single or group classes, but may receive **only two** premiums per class.

A copy of the health certificate must be sent with the entry form. Vet check will start at 7 am and end at 8:30 am.

This show is sanctioned by the American Dairy Goat Association and is open only to animals that are registered in the following associations: ADGA, AGS, and DGS. ADGA rules shall govern. The Junior and Senior shows are not separately sanctioned.

READ AND FOLLOW ALL RULES:

1. Entry fee is \$1.50 per entry per class. Exhibitors must include \$5.00 for exhibitor ticket. Make checks payable to Otsego County Fair.

2. Entries close July 19, 2010.
3. The base date for computing the age is the day of the show.
4. The original registration certificate is required for all animals six months of age or older and must be shown to the Show Secretary before start of the show. The original registration or duplicate registry application stamped by ADGA is required on all animals under six months of age.
5. Current health papers are required.
6. There will be no pre-show milk out.
7. No Bucks to the show.
8. An exhibitor may enter as many animals per class as he/she pays entry fee for, but may only receive two premiums per class - ribbons awarded as judged.
9. Animals shown in group classes must have been shown in individual classes.
10. A family may show as one exhibitor or members

of a family may show as individual exhibitors.

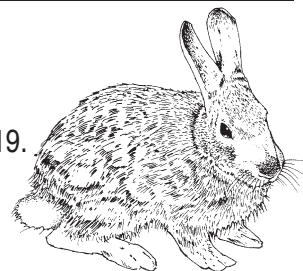

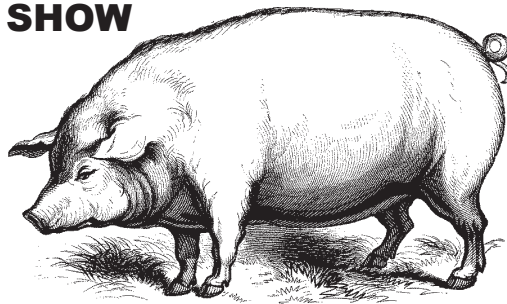

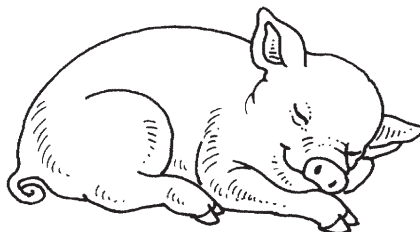
RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. Entries in this department close on July 19. There will be absolutely no entries after that date.
2. Entry Fee: \$2.00 per entry in each class.
3. Competition is open to exhibitors in Otsego County and any other county open to Otsego County swine exhibitors.
4. The Otsego County Fair Association, Inc., assumes no responsibilities in case of injury, loss, theft, or damages to stock or other exhibits, from any cause, and upon this condition only are entries received; and the Association will not assume any liability for personal injury sustained by exhibitors, helpers, visitors, or guests.
5. The Association reserved the right to accept or reject any entry, and to return any entry fee before the opening or judging of the show without being liable for compensation.
6. Each exhibitor must conform to the livestock health regulations of the Department of Agriculture and Markets as specified at the beginning of this book.
7. No animals will be unloaded or penned unless they are accompanied by a certificate indicating freedom from any contagious or infectious disease and checked by the State Veterinarian or Swine Superintendent.
8. Exhibits must be in place 8:00 pm Monday and will not be released until after 7:30 pm on Sunday.
9. Exhibitor is limited to no more than two (2) entries

per class.

10. Judging for boar classes will be done in all registered and crossbred.
11. Judging for female classes will be done in all registered and crossbred.
12. Market hogs exhibited may be purebred or crossbred barrows or gilts.
13. Market hogs must be weighed on the fairgrounds in order to be shown.
14. Sow with litters: A class for sow and their litters shall be judged. Entries may be purebred or crossbred. The litters should not be more than six (6) weeks old. Judging shall be based on 50% on the sow and 50% on her litter.
15. All animals must be ear notched or tattooed for identification.
16. All exhibits shall be clean and ready each morning no later than 9:00 am.

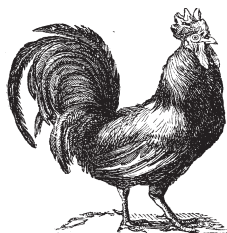

Judging Thursday 10 am - Rules and Regulations



1. Entries must be made with entry clerk per clerk's calendar.

2. This department will accept entries from exhibitors who live in Otsego County & the neighboring fairs that are open to Otsego County.

3. Entries will be accepted on a first come, first serve basis. Maximum number of entries to be accepted in all sections of this department will be determined by the number of cages available. No exceptions will be made. Waterfowl will be limited to the available space.

4. A cock is a male bird over one year, a hen is a female bird one year, a cockerel is male bird 3 months to one year, a pullet is a female bird 3 months to one year. An Old Trio is 1 year and over, a Young Trio is 3 months to one year.

5. All poultry entered for premiums must be entered in the name of the owner, such ownership to have existed at least 30 days previous to the time of showing.

6. All standard poultry will be judged by expert judges in accordance with the latest edition of the American Standard of Perfection and premiums allowed only on varieties mentioned herein. In order to avoid confusion and criticism from the State Department of Agriculture it will be necessary for exhibitors to write name of the variety as well as breed of poultry.

7. Superintendent is authorized to exclude all exhibits showing a diseased or parasite condition.

8. Price for entries will be \$1.00 per entry, \$2.00 per pair, this includes coop & space rental. Superintendent will assign locations for exhibits.

9. May enter multiple birds in one class but no exhibitor shall be allowed to receive more than two premiums for any one class.

10. No judge shall be permitted to enter exhibits in competition for premiums in the department with which they are connected.

11. All birds must be in their natural condition and in good health. The pulling of stubs, or false feathers, bleaching of feathers, removal of side springs, or any other method of faking is not permitted and if discovered

will debar the exhibitor from the show.

12. Competent people will be in charge, but no responsibility will be assumed by the management for any loss or damage, birds being entered at the sole risk of the owner. Any bird showing signs of sickness will be isolated and possibly removed from Fairgrounds.

13. No birds or animals can be removed until 8:00 p.m. Sunday evening or Monday 8:00 a.m. til 12:00 noon. Fair Association is not responsible for any poultry or pet stock left on the grounds after 1:00 p.m. on Monday following the fair.

14. Birds will be received Monday 8:00 a.m. - 8:00 p.m. All exhibits must be in place by 8:00 p.m. Monday.

15. Exhibitors are responsible for feeding, watering and care of their birds and maintaining a clean and attractive exhibit for the public.

16. Exhibitors are responsible for cleaning out cages and exhibits and must get a release slip before leaving the grounds. Failure to do so will revoke premiums.

17. Exhibitors, upon release from the fair, are advised to follow animal health precautions.
